Pupil Premium Grant Expenditure: 2020/2021

St Alban's C of E Academy has high aspirations for all its pupils, not least those who are disadvantaged - not only for their academic development, but also for their personal growth, mental health and well-being and their emerging life-skills, which are held up by staff and pupils alike as being of equal importance.

Our vision "Learning, Growing and Exploring Together with God" is reflected in the drive, commitment and aspirations of all staff and governors to address and overcome socio-economic factors which may hinder children's progress and attainment, and ultimately their life chances.

Each year we evaluate the impact of the spending and continue to innovate the curriculum in our ongoing drive to build futures together. We have planned to use our Pupil Premium Grant to support the aspirations we have for this group of children and to meet their individual need, but the firm foundation of their success is providing them with quality first teaching in every lesson and every day.

Our key objective in using the Pupil Premium Grant is to narrow the gap between pupil groups. Through targeted interventions we are working to eliminate barriers to learning and progress. For children who start school with low attainment on entry, our aim is to ensure that they make accelerated progress in order to at least reach age related expectations as they move through the school.

We believe that one of the biggest barriers for children can be poverty of expectation: we are determined to create a climate that does not limit a child's potential in any way and allows them to reach their God given potential. Vulnerable families within our community can lack engagement with education which in turn, creates a barrier for children's own expectations.

The school is located in an area of high social deprivation and has a high percentage of children are eligible for FSM: this can bring with it some complex challenges. However, staff are committed to ensuring that these challenges are mitigated so that all pupils can reach their full God given potential.

Another barrier for children is access to adequate technology, especially during the current climate where remote learning should be accessed when children are isolating.

A lack of cultural capital and experiences can impede the children's ability to contextualise learning and we aim to reduce this barrier through an exciting, relevant curriculum that encourages children to broaden their horizons and aspirations.

Impact of PP Grant 2020 - 2021

In 2020 — 2021 despite national school lockdowns our Pupil Premium children (disadvantaged and ever 6) increased the percentage attaining age related expectations in all subjects. In the majority of classes PP children were broadly in line with their non PP peers. During school lockdowns PP children were actively encouraged to attend school, which enabled them to make at least expected progress whilst at school. The other PP children were supported through comprehensive remote learning packages, with some receiving additional virtual one-to-one support at home. Our Family Support Worker assisted many of our PP families experiencing social and emotional issues supporting their mental health and wellbeing, which aided the children to continue to access their learning. Throughout this turbulent year we ensured the vast majority of our PP children made a good level of progress in all subject.
